SERMON: GENESIS – WRESTLING WITH GOD (Genesis 32)

As Jacob is running from his brother, he wrestles with God in the middle of the night. Have you ever felt like you were wrestling with God? Counterintuitively, our greatest struggles with God can lead to great growth in our strength and in our faith. God uses even our weaknesses to His glory, if we humble ourselves and cling to His strength.

Have you ever been at odds with another person, even a family member? How did it feel?

Discuss the principle: "The more you watch out for yourself, the lonelier and emptier you'll become."

Discuss its converse: "The more you give of yourself, the more connected and fuller your life will become."

How is Jacob's wrestling with God (Genesis 32:22-32) similar to Peter's discussion with Jesus in John 21:15-19?

How is wrestling with God a metaphor for your struggles in life?

What may God be teaching you through your struggles?

How might He be wanting to change you through them?

Do you think you're resisting God's changes in your life?

Why might you still be wrestling Him? Are you perhaps waiting for a blessing from God?

If you're waiting for God to bless you, what are you waiting for?

What greater purpose does God want to do through you that you may be delaying by wrestling with Him?

How can you move forward in strength by embracing your weakness? How is that a blessing?

Taking it home / Memory Verse:

And he said unto me, My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness. Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me. – 2 Corinthians 12:9




That night Jacob got up and took his two wives, his two female servants and his eleven sons and crossed the ford of the Jabbok.

The principle: The more you watch out for yourself, the lonelier and emptier you'll become.


