There was something about standing on the same ground, in a grove of trees where Jesus spent some of his final hours on this earth that is incredibly meaningful.

To some degree, that's what we try to accomplish every year during the season of Lent. We ponder what it was like for Jesus to love His children so much that He would endure suffering, shame and even death for them — for us... This year we will journey through Lent with two different

message series – one on Sunday mornings, and one on Wednesday evenings.

The Sunday morning series takes a look at how Jesus spent His final days. He was aware that His time on earth was coming to an end. How He spends His final days can give us keen insight into how we should spend each day. Our time on earth is coming to an end as well.

On Wednesday Evenings, we will again have a readers' theater that allows us to be visited by a cast of characters from the Bible. The setting will be that of a courtroom. Two thousand years have come and gone since Caiaphas and Pilate passed judgment on Jesus in Jerusalem. And though the verdict passed down at that trial was a miscarriage of justice, the result fulfilled God's purpose: to save the world by sacrificing His Son. During this midweek series, court will again be in session to determine who Christ is. And what does He mean for our lives on earth? The

circumstances require a verdict.
How will you find the defendant?

GROWTH GROUPS, CONT. SALT & LIGHT

The Salt & Light Ministry, believing we should participate in the civil arena regarding Biblical issues, participated in the San Diego Walk for Life on Saturday, January 20. It was a demonstration of support for the sanctity of life. This position, of course, is not the position taken by many in all levels of government that has resulted in the passage of laws, nationally, statewide, and locally that removes Godly principles from the public square. It was not always like that, not by a long shot. Remember that the Founders relied on the Bible in education; early text books quoted the Bible; Congress printed the 1st English language Bible for schools; innumerable quotes from governmental leaders who spoke openly about the



importance of living a Godly principled life. In other words, God's principles were central to the Founders actions. They believed in both individual and national accountability to God. As Founder, George Mason, known as "The Father of the Bill of Rights" said at the Constitutional Convention in 1787, "As nations cannot be rewarded or punished in the next world, they must be in this. By an inevitable chain of causes and effects Providence punishes national sins by national calamities." The Founders were emphatic that God would deal with nations in the present for the policies it enacts. That is why they wanted leaders who honor God's principles in office. But voters must embrace those principles and act on them when they vote. If they don't then Godless people become leaders and enact legislation that God cannot bless, hence the need to have "Walk for Life' demonstrations; opposition to the abortion policies of Planned Parenthood (to better understand this organization please read the Salt & Light

fact sheet on Planned Parenthood); voter guides focused only on the candidates position of Biblical issues; supporting 20 Week Pain Capable legislation; promoting thought provoking videos, etc.

Thomas Jefferson said, "I tremble for my country when I reflect that God is just — that His justice cannot sleep forever." And Samuel Adams quoted scripture when he said, "Him that honoreth Me, I will honor; but he that despiseth Me shall be lightly esteemed." (1 Samuel 2:30)

PARENTING CHRISTIAN KIDS: EXPLORE THE POWER OF A NAME

"A good name is more desirable than great riches; to be esteemed is better than silver or gold."—Proverbs 22:1

The names we use for God affect children's perception of him. To some kids, God is a magical being or an old man with a long white beard. Kids'

questions at each age level offer insights into who they perceive God to be. Preschoolers may ask if God loves them and if he's like Daddy or another father figure. Talk about God in terms of your child's immediate experiences and activities. By age 4 or 5, children wonder where God is and how he made things. Share short essential truths, admitting that we can't know

everything about God because he's so great. By ages 6 to 8, children are curious about things beyond their environment, and by the preteen years, they want to know why bad things happen. Be prepared for skepticism, ask follow-up questions, and assure kids it's good to keep learning about Jesus.

Name Meanings Get a baby-name book or find a website that explains name meanings. Help family members find out what their names mean. Ask: "Why are names important? What's it like to be called the wrong name? Can you imagine having another name?" Read aloud John 10:1-5 as a reminder that God knows each of us by name.

Naming Game Read a child-friendly version of the Creation account (Genesis 1 & 2) and talk about the important naming job God gave Adam. Ask: "If you were

told to name all the animals, what names would you choose? Why?"

Seeing Stars Go outside at night and look at the stars together. Afterward, read aloud Psalm 147:4. Say: "The Bible says God knows how many stars there are *and* that he knows the name of each one. That's because God made all the stars. God knows our names, too—because he made us all. And he knows everything about us." Say a prayer, thanking God for naming and knowing us.

Good Name Game Stand in a circle to play this memory game. Say: "Let's take turns saying our names and something we like to do, while acting it out. Before saying your name and doing your action, you must repeat the names and actions of the people before you." Keep adding actions until recall becomes too difficult. Then read aloud Proverbs 22:1. Ask: "What does it mean to have a good name? How can you make sure your choices and actions give you a good name?"

Who's Who? Write the names of Bible people on index cards—one per card. Tape a card on each person's forehead and display a master list of names. Then ask yesor-no questions to discover your identity. Start out broad, such as "Am I a boy? Am I a girl?" Then get more specific, such as "Am I in Jesus' family?" "Did I build something?" To provide fodder for formulating questions, include factoids about each person on the list.

Name Freeze Put a beanbag on each family member's head. Say: "Walk around. If your beanbag falls off, you must freeze in place—until someone says your name and puts the beanbag back on your head." After playing, talk about why it's important to know others' names and to use them in kind ways.

STEWARDSHIP

"I am not commanding you, but I want to test the sincerity of your love by comparing it with the earnestness of others. For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that you through his poverty might become rich" (2 Corinthians 8:8-9).

Without commands or even arm-twisting, St. Paul encourages, even challenges, the Church in Corinth to demonstrate the sincerity of their faith by their generosity in giving. He does this because giving generously is a gift of the Spirit given to us through the Gospel.

St. Paul wrote: "But just as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness and in your love for us—see that you also excel in this grace of giving" (2 Corinthians 8:7). In other words, just as we grow in faith and speech and knowledge of eternal things by the Holy Spirit through the Word of God, so also do we grow in giving from the same Spirit through the same Word.

The problem is that the grace of generosity often grows cold in us. It's not so much that we stop giving, but we don't put it first. We treat it like all the other bills that must be paid. It becomes a chore, just one more thing to check off a list of things to do. That empties it of its spiritual power and robs us of the joy that Christ and the Scriptures assign to it.

Bring your commitment card anytime in February and place it in the offering plate. There are extras in the pews. If you did not receive a Giving to His Glory packet, you may pick up one in the lobby.

On top of that, since this generosity is linked to faith and knowledge of divine things, a lack of excelling in giving is a sure sign that our faith and knowledge of God are under attack as well.

Thus St. Paul points to the foundation of generosity: the

generosity of Christ Himself. Even though He was rich, He became poor so that we who are poor might become rich. Thus, the incarnation, suffering, and death of our Lord on the cross is the reason, source, and driving force for our generosity in giving to the church.

And since Christ who was rich became poor so that we might be rich in His grace—of which generous giving is part—so we also who are rich in His grace can excel in pressing His grace into service toward the gracious work of the church.

Pay attention to what you give to the church so that you may excel at it. And if you find that your heart has grown cold or indifferent toward it, immerse yourself in God's Word. Read it at home. Attend Bible Class. Hear and listen to it preached in the Divine Service.

Be reminded of what Christ has done for you in His incarnation, suffering, and death. For this will strengthen your faith and knowledge. And where that excels, so will the grace of giving excel also.

He met his wife, Barbara when he was in the army. They were married for $52 \frac{1}{2}$ years.



GETHSEMANE, GIVING & GENERATION Z, CONT FROM PG 1.

Why do we do this? It is not so that we can "raise" enough funds to carry out ministry — though funds are required to carry out ministry in this place. It is not so that we can "corner" our members into making a guilt-driven response — though Christ does commend the practice of tithing when He upholds it as valid in Matthew 23:23

"Woe to you, teachers of the law and Pharisees, you hypocrites! You give a tenth of your spices—mint, dill and cumin. But you have neglected the more important matters of the law—justice, mercy and faithfulness. You should have practiced the latter, without neglecting the former."

The difference for New Testament Christians is that giving is a matter of the heart, not one of the Law. In other words, we give in *response* to God's goodness, we don't give in an effort to *earn* His goodness. Quite simply, because of Christ, believers are no longer under the Law. That means that the requirement of tithing is not a rigid one. However, out of love for God and in recognition of His goodness and blessing, Christians regularly make generous, first-fruit, proportional and sacrificial offerings. And since the Apostle Paul taught the Christians at Corinth to *"set aside a sum of money in keeping with your income,"* (1 Cor. 16:2) we have a practice of making a plan (setting aside) to give regularly throughout the year to the Lord's work through His Church. The Commitment Card is a tool used in that process. And so, regardless of what

you decide in your heart to give, we would love to have you participate in this practice of "setting aside a sum" in advance.

Finally, this month we will have an opportunity to learn about "Generation Z." This term refers to youth who were born between 1995 and 2010. They are the next "cohort" or generation that sociologists have defined. But what makes them special? What do they think about the world, and about the church? And how can we work with them to help them see God and His World the way that the Bible teaches? It's a tall order — especially in today's post-Church post-Christian era.

The workshop presenter is Gilbert Fugitt, member of Redeemer by the Sea and the Dean of Students at Concordia University, in Irvine. Dr. Fugitt has worked for many years as a Director of Christian Education at our Savior Lutheran Church in Arcadia, California, and now in his role as Dean of Students, works with student leaders to help Concordia produce wise, honorable and cultivated graduates to serve the Lord in their professional and personal lives.

The "Generation Z" workshop will be presented in the Fellowship Hall on Sunday February 11th at 9:45 am. Childcare is provided, and students are encouraged to attend.
